Fall Fox Hunt Anyone?

Autumn is the traditional time for the horse mounted fox hunts in Britton and other countries - seems like a good time for a HAM fox hunt, too.

If you're not familiar with fox hunts, also known as Amateur Radio Direction Finding (ARDF) or transmitter hunts, they are basically a contest to find a hidden transmitter. HAMs use directional antennas to try and narrow down the location of a transmitter sends out messages every couple of minutes.

There are a lot of variations, but LARC fox hunts have been mobile hunts where participants travel in cars to try and find a "fox" within the city limits. Competition is friendly, and after a 3 to 4 hour hunt, there's usually a get together at a donut shop where various excuses are presented to all assembled.

The directional antennas that are used with hand held radios are easily made, and we can put on a workshop if people want assistance in making one.


- DIP meter
